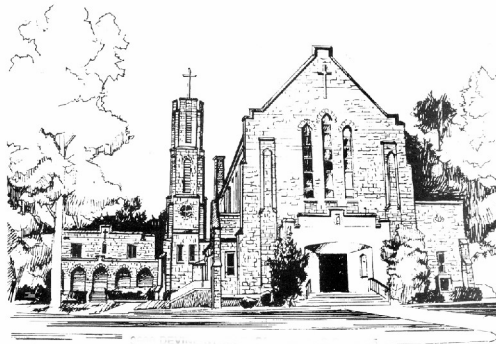

SINNERS, SAINTS, & SACRAMENTS: HOW FOUR ECUMENICAL COUNCILS SHAPED CATHOLIC PIETY: Joshua Burgess

8 sessions beginning September 8

Throughout the history of the Catholic Church, few institutions have influenced the practice of Christianity more profoundly than the ecumenical council. These irregular meetings of the bishops of the Church have convened at various times and places to settle doctrinal disputes, define dogma, and formulate creeds. Yet on a more practical level, these councils have often been turning points in the devotional lives of ordinary Christians. This 8-week course will explore the role of four councils, Nicea I (325), Lateran IV (1215), Trent (1545-1563), and Vatican II (1962-65) in shaping the way ordinary men and women practiced their faith in late antiquity, medieval Europe, post-Reformation Europe, and in the modern United States.

10 sessions beginning September 8

The importance of the Catholic Epistles lies primarily in the fact that they offer a non-Pauline witness to the beliefs and practices of the first Christian communities. Through these letters we get a truer picture of early Church life than is available to us in the Gospels or in the Acts of the Apostles. These writers were responding to real needs in the early Christian communities, and by examining these problems we are better able to understand the latter years of first-century Christianity. We will also look at the implications of being authentically Christian in our own century.

Imagine what it was like for Julia Child to walk through all the shops and markets of Paris in search of fresh, in-season ingredients for her dinner. Those who know the basic French culinary techniques like to survey the outside aisles of the grocery store, looking at the produce, meats, and dairy products that look fresh and are on sale.

Each of our cooking classes will be centered upon a basic French Culinary Technique. We will learn how to poach, blanch, glaze, sauté, roast, slow roast, cook en papillote, and braise. Every class will include knife skills. Of course many dishes will have a sauce. Even more exciting, we will eat what we cook! In order to facilitate hands-on instruction, class size is strictly limited.
