From Your Treasurer; "All about Mary"

This Easter Season has left me reflecting on the Resurrection. Have you ever wondered where Mary was? Why wasn't she at the tomb with the other women? I did some research and am giving you an excerpt of an article by the National Register April 6, 2021:

After His Resurrection, Jesus Appeared First to His Mother Mary, Say the Saints

Pope St. John Paul II

"The Gospels mention various appearances of the risen Christ, but not a meeting between Jesus and his Mother. This silence must not lead to the conclusion that after the Resurrection Christ did not appear to Mary; rather it invites us to seek the reasons why the Evangelists made such a choice," St. John Paul II, the great Marian saint, told everyone at a general audience May 21, 1997.

At an audience a year earlier, he reminded that Mary witnessed the entire paschal mystery and "alone remains to keep alive the flame of faith, preparing to receive the joyful and astonishing announcement of the Resurrection."

If the evangelists didn't write about Mary's encounter with her risen Son Jesus, "this can perhaps be attributed to the fact that such a witness would have been considered too biased by those who denied the Lord's Resurrection, and therefore not worthy of belief," John Paul II continued in 1997.

The great saint offered another reason too. The Gospels list only a few appearances by the risen Lord, "certainly not a complete summary of all that happened during the 40 days after Easter." For instance, St. Paul highlights that Jesus appeared "to more than 500 brethren at one time" (1 Corinthians 15:6). How is it, John Paul II asked, "that an exceptional event known to so many is not mentioned by the Evangelists?" Obviously, the Evangelists didn't record all Jesus' appearances.

"How could the Blessed Virgin, present in the first community of disciples (Acts 1:14), be excluded from those who met her divine Son after he had risen from the dead?" asked John Paul II. "Indeed, it is legitimate to think that the Mother was probably the first person to whom the risen Jesus appeared."

Posing another question, he asked rhetorically if Mary's not joining the women going to the tomb at dawn can "indicate that she had already met Jesus? Those women had been faithful and had been at the Cross. Of course, Our Lady had been the most faithful of all."

John Paul II offered yet another reason for believing Jesus appeared first to his mother:

'The unique and special character of the Blessed Virgin's presence at Calvary and her perfect union with the Son in his suffering on the Cross seem to postulate a very particular sharing on her part in the mystery of the Resurrection."

Thus, this appearance would be part of "completing in this way her participation in all the essential moments of the paschal mystery."

So it's "reasonable to think that Mary, as the image and model of the Church which waits for the Risen One and meets him in the group of disciples during his Easter appearances, had had a personal contact with her risen Son, so that she too could delight in the fullness of paschal joy."

OUR LENT WITH MARY

Lent is the time when the Church focuses on the mystery of our salvation. When the Angel informed St. Joseph about Jesus, he emphasized that his child would save people from their sins. The name "Jesus" means "Savior". Therefore, we should focus on the meaning of sin and then the power of the paschal resurrection will be more meaningful to us.

Sin is usually defined as the breaking of God's law. That means acting unjustly towards God in thought, word, or deed. Since God is our Creator, our Savior and our Sanctifier, sins are acts that violate our relationship with him in any of those three areas of our relationship with the Most Holy Trinity, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Sin is divided into two categories: mortal and venial. Mortal means a "death blow" to the relationship. Venial means "damaging" but not destructive. In marriages, there can be frequent squabbles about minor things which are easily amendable. But adultery goes to the very heart of the relationship.

There was a situation where a woman filed a harassment case against her husband's employer. It turned out that no one where the husband worked knew that he was married. He always removed his wedding ring before going to work. His female employer, therefore, flirted with him. The absence of the ring was a public denial of his love for his wife, the uprooting of the marital bond, bordering on psychological adultery.

So, sin is the denial of the love that God desires and deserves from us in the area of creation (such as by being pro-abortion), salvation (by ignoring occasions of sin), sanctification (by not remaining in the state of grace which keeps us united to God).

As our spiritual Mother, given to us during the very act of salvation on Calvary, Mary is most solicitous about our relationship with God – Creator, Redeemer, and Sanctifier. The Church venerates her as Refuge of Sinners. This invocation points to the hope of forgiveness and reconciliation which she can obtain for us after realizing the severity of the injustice of sin.

Related to this is her title Consolation of the Afflicted. Lest depression or despair dominate the repentant heart, our Lady comes with the balm of soothing hope. She reminds us that the redeeming sacrifice of Jesus in the Eucharist is our consolation on earth and the source of our peace and salvation.

That is the importance of the sacrament of Reconciliation/Confession. Converts to the Catholic faith frequently describe the lifting of the weight of years of sin when experiencing their first confession. The devotion to the Divine Mercy is strongly related to this.

And so, we prepare ourselves to be open to the joy of Christ's resurrection with its eternal benefits in the everlasting spiritual banquet as our Lord describes in the parable of the Prodigal Son who is greeted with a heartfelt magnanimous embrace by the forgiving Father.

St. Mary Magdalen went through a deep period of sorrow with our Blessed Mother on the way of the cross and finally on Calvary. Her hope was shattered until Jesus restored it when she heard his familiar voice call out to her "Mary". She wanted to embrace him because her heart was once again filled with his loving presence. He sent her to the Apostles to declare that "I have seen the Lord!" – The Paschal Lord, that is. She no longer lived for herself, but for him who died and rose again for us, as St. Paul points out in

This truth answers St. Paul's desire, "May the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ enlighten the eyes of our hearts to know the hope that belongs to our call." [Eph. 1:17]
