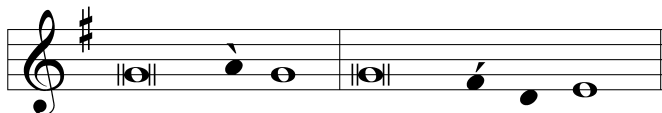

## From the Organ Bench

The hymn *Have Mercy, Lord, on Us* is known by the hymn tune name of SOUTHWELL and was composed by William Daman (c. 1540-1591). The tune first appeared in Denham's Psalter, which was printed in 1579. Contemporary accounts from the Renaissance period in England speculate that William was originally born in Italy (perhaps Tuscany) and that his surname had been "Damano." His popular tune has appeared in over 150 hymnals.

Jean Langlais was a famous blind organist, teacher, and composer who served the Basilica of Ste. Clotilde in Paris from 1945 until 1988. During his lifetime, Langlais penned over 250 compositions including Five Sacred Motets for organ and two female voices. The English translation for the Latin motet "O Bone Jesu" is:

O good Jesus, have mercy upon us,  
for thou hast created us,  
thou hast redeemed us  
by thy most precious blood.

The postlude heard today is an ornamented chorale setting by Dietrich Buxtehude and is thematically based upon our Communion hymn, "Take up Your Cross." In the year 1705, a young, twenty-year-old Johann Sebastian Bach walked from his home in central Germany to the major northern city of Lübeck to learn from the famous Buxtehude, who was organist at St. Mary's. This pilgrimage has long been a topic of humor for musicologists and church organists, because Bach had only been granted a short period of time from his home parish to be away and he should have returned by November of 1705. However, Bach had other plans and wanted to hear the famous Advent concerts in the northern city and ended up staying until February of 1706 - he was nearly four months late to work at his church in Arnstadt and had missed the entire season of Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany! You can well imagine that when he returned home that his church was NOT at all pleased with him!
